She outlined strat-

egies Drain Commissioners can deploy to ensure our communities are resilient including raingardens, bioswales, agricultural buffer strips, porous pavements and underground slow release storage tanks, among others. State's Only Venomous Snake Now "Threatened"

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The state's only venomous snake, the *Eastern Massasauga Rattlesnake*, has been federally designated as a threatened species.

Officials with the **U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service** on Thursday took action to list the snake as threatened under the federal **Endangered Species Act**.

Eastern Massasaugas can be found in scattered locations in Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Michigan, New York, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Wisconsin and Ontario.

In Michigan, most of the snakes are located in southern portions of the state. None have been found in the Upper Peninsula.

Michigan Department of Natural Resources leaders issued a notice Friday about the effort to protect the species.

"Conservation of this rare snake is critical, because it plays an important role as a predator of small mammals," DNR endangered species specialist **Dan Kennedy** said. "The DNR is currently working with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and many other partners to develop a reasonable

approach to conserve this rare snake in Michigan."

DNR specialists describe the *Massasauga* as a small snake with a thick body, heart-shaped head and vertical pupils, with an average length of about 2 feet.

"They eat small rodents such as mice and voles and will sometimes eat frogs and other snakes. They are docile, secretive snakes that will try to escape rather than defend themselves or fight," according to a DNR description.

Enbridge #5 Pipeline at the Straits of Mackinac

Our **Dwight Lydell Chapter** took a resolution proposal to this year's **National Convention** regarding this 62 year-old pipeline. To bring you up to date the pipeline was discussed in the July and August newsletters and in the public media for a long time. The resolution proposal to advocate for a "dual walled" pipeline was accepted and is now official League policy. The policy isn't worth the paper it is printed on if it isn't acted on! Action is taking place. I had been in contact with **Senator Stabenow's** office prior to the resolution because she has been active and initiated one or more bills. But watching how a "bill" moves is like watching a glacier move. Since convention I inform the Senator of our new policy and have received this response from a staff person.

Following this contact and discussion with **Scott Kovarovics**, IWLA Executive Director and **John Dickel** the **Energy and Environment Resource Committee Chairperson** I contacted **Venture Engineering and Construction Co**, Pittsburgh, PA who's "White Paper" we relied heavily on when finalizing our policy.

Link to the "white Paper" where it is stated in the 6th paragraph "*The most compelling reason for a double wall pipe, instead of a robust single wall pipeline, is the containment of a product leak.*"

"Robert, Thank you for the email regarding **Enbridge's Line 5** and the idea of inserting a dual wall. This is something that our office will inquire about to both Enbridge and the **Pipeline and Hazardous Materials Safety Administration.**"
